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
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A LETTER FROM THE DIRECTOR

Well, after a 38-year museum career I am announcing my retirement from the Art Museum of Southeast Texas. I have served as the museum's Executive Director since 2000. Prior to that, I worked in different capacities within the organization, twice as Interim Director, Curator of Exhibitions and Collections for 12 years, and Registrar for one year. I started working at the museum when we opened, what was then, our new facility downtown and changed our name from the Beaumont Art Museum to the Art Museum of Southeast Texas. With strong support from the Board of Trustees and committed donors, I oversaw a major expansion of the museum's classroom, effectively doubling its size and helped to grow the investment fund by 800%. I have also had the pleasure of watching the museum's collection grow from 250 to just under 2,000 objects, which includes a major collection of Mexican Folk Art that was acquired in 2017 and 2020. I also oversaw the reaccreditation of the museum through the American Alliance of Museums two times. AMSET's Board of Trustees has formed a search committee and is working diligently to find my successor.

Upon my retirement I plan to move to the Yakima, Washington area so that I will be closer to my grandchildren and other Washington family. I love Beaumont and am sorry to leave all of my friends and colleagues, but the pull to finally be near family and back out west again after 38 years is strong.

Thank you for allowing me to serve the art community of Southeast Texas.

HIGH SCHOOL SENIOR ART TAKEOVER:

2025 PROTÉGÉ COMPETITION AND EXHIBITION

In its 39th year, the 2025 Protégé Competition and Exhibition was a continued success as it was on view in the Conn Gallery at the Art Museum of Southeast Texas. The Protégé Competition and Exhibition was created specifically to encourage graduating high school seniors to begin taking the steps necessary to become active in the art world.

This year's Protégé juror was Orna Feinstein, an internationally recognized artist and a world traveler. Orna earned her B.F.A in sculpture from the University of Houston, and a diploma in printmaking from the Glassell school of Art. Feinstein's work has been included in many solo and group exhibitions around the world, including galleries, art centers, and museums.


On Tuesday, March 4th, teachers, friends, and family joined the Art Museum of Southeast Texas staff for the opening reception of the 39th Annual Protégé Competition & Exhibition. If you missed the opening reception and awards ceremony, it can be found on AMSET's Facebook page.

The 2025 Protégé Competition and Exhibition was open to 12 counties around Texas. This year, AMSET had over 80 entries from 13 schools; Feinstein selected 20 works for the exhibition. In partnership with Lamar University Friends of the Arts, AMSET was able to offer the first, second and third prize winner's scholarships to committed Lamar University art majors.

Thanks to a generous bequest by Stewart M. Chisum and Bessie Fisher Chisum, AMSET oiffered an additional \$2,500 college scholarship to the first-place winner. Thank you to Market Basket as the presenting sponsor for supporting Protégé for 39 years and counting.

TOM JEAN WEBB: A TRUE FAIRYTALE MARCH 29 - JUNE 15, 2025

AMSET is pleased to present two new exhibitions for its spring quarter titled Tom Jean Webb: *A True Fairytale* and José Villalobos: *An In Between | Un Intermedio*.

Tom Jean Webb presents a new body of mixed media work for his exhibition *A True Fairytale*. Originally from the UK, Tom was based in Austin until recently returning home to pursue his graduate studies. His artwork demonstrates his deep admiration for the expansive landscapes of the American Southwest. His paintings and sculpture focus on the relationship between the human experience and the natural world, allowing the viewer to reflect upon the personal journeys we all encounter. Webb's poetic, and sometimes playful imagery simultaneously grounds the viewer and reminds them that the mysterious, arbitrary, and sometimes absurd is part of life. *A True Fairytale* includes new, never before seen, mixed media canvases, as well as a newly commissioned seesaw sculpture. Visitors will be able to interact with the seesaw, as well as contribute to the exhibition by decorating and placing rocks within the space. The Conn Take pART Education Gallery includes a rock decorating station, as well as custom coloring pages designed by Webb for display in the Education Gallery or to be taken home.

JOSÉ VILLALOBOS: AN IN BETWEEN | UN INTERMEDIO MARCH 29 - JUNE 15, 2025

For its other spring 2025 exhibition, the Art Museum of Southeast Texas is pleased to announce the opening of José Villalobos: *An In Between (Un Intermedio)*. The exhibition features the work of San Antonio-based artist José Villalobos, whose multi-media practice objects and disrupts culturally accepted stereotypes of toxic masculinity.

Villalobos grew up on the US/Mexico border in El Paso, TX, and was raised in a traditional and religiously conservative family. The root of Villalobos's work lies in the performativity of his identity. His work reconciles the identity challenges in his life, caught in between traditional Mexican customs and American mores, as well as growing up with religious ideals that conflict and condemn being gay. Through his mixed media works and performances, Villalobos confronts the derogatory terms and attitudes that he continues to withstand today. He protests the toxicity of machismo using objects, specifically within the norteño culture, that carry a history by deconstructing and altering them.

An In Between (Un Intermedio) includes works from Villalobos' oeuvre that focus on the themes of living in-between cultures and identities, including photographs, mirrored 2-D works, free standing sculptures, and a video room to view past performances. A performance by Villalobos, titled Deeply Rooted, Cultured and Silence, took place at AMSET the night of the opening reception.

ONVIEW... WEST HALL EXHIBITION

ORNA FEINSTEIN: POLE TO POLE THROUGH MAY 13, 2025

For its second West Hall installation of the new year, AMSET presents Orna Feinstein: *Pole to Pole*. Houston-based artist Orna Feinstein is this year's Protégé High School Art Competition and Exhibition juror. She specializes in 3D monoprints and other mixed media. This is the third time her work has been on display at AMSET.

For *Pole to Pole*, Feinstein has drawn together works from her *Dendriform Series* and *The Presence of Absence Series*. The Dendriform Series are monoprints with collage that were created in the Arctic Circle in 2023 while *The Presence of Absence Series* are monoprints with collage that were created in Antarctica in 2023. A small selection of four works made while in Patagonia is also included in the exhibition. Feinstein traveled to Antarctica, the Arctic Circle and Patagonia on 3 separate occasions in 2023. She made art on the ships while traveling, as well as on location. Feinstein was also able to exhibit her works while visiting, making her the first artist to make and exhibit art on both poles within six months. She is also the first artist to have an art exhibition on the border of Chile and Argentina, and in front of the Perito Moreno glacier.

Feinstein developed the idea for creating and exhibiting work on the Poles when she realized a few days before her first trip that she would be traveling somewhere without trees or other green vegetation. Focusing on creating abstract works inspired by nature, a concept she has pursued in her art-making for decades, Feinstein was able to bring a sense of nature and vegetation to these remote places through her monoprints. This sense of abstracted flora can be seen in Feinstein's use of warm, earthy tones, such as rich yellow greens, and organic line work that seems to expand and grow off the edges of the paper.

BROOKE HOOD: THE AVIARY JANUARY 30 - APRIL 27, 2025

This quarter's Café Arts Series exhibition features the works of local artist Brooke Hood. Hood recently moved her family to Beaumont from San Antonio for her husband, Dr. Caleb Hood, to take up a position as a professor in Lamar University's Education Department. Her background includes a BS in Interior Design from Abilene Christian University and a love of art fostered by her parents Alan and Cheryl Stine.

Hood has become well known throughout Southeast Texas for her variety of subject matter, including beautiful female portraits, mid-century modern inspired compositions, and stylized bird and wildlife paintings. She works with a variety of materials, including acrylic on canvas and collage.

For The Aviary, Hood presents a body of paintings that re-imagine some of the common birds of Southeast Texas. She writes, "I've placed these birds at the border of their real and imagined habitats. The bold gestural marks, splashes, and texture hint [at] the unpredictable energy of birds. The birds and habitats are not depicted literally, but rather as shapes, sweeping curves, [and] bursts of chaotic lines." She hopes that viewers will imagine the gallery as an aviary, which holds birds through their painted forms.


CAFÉ ARTS SERIES PRESENTS: CARLO BUSCEME IV ON VIEW MAY 1 - JULY 27, 2025

OPENING RECEPTION MAY 1, 2025 FROM 5:30 TO 7:30 PM

Southeast Texas local Carlo Busceme will have a solo exhibition in the museum's Café Arts space early this summer. Busceme's exhibition will include graphite on paper and panel drawings, as well as acrylic on canvas and panel paintings.

When asked about his inspirations, Busceme listed the design of the McMaster-Carr website as a source of recent interest. McMaster-Carr is an industrial supply company, whose website is minimal, mostly grayscale, with simple click-through images of a wide variety of fasteners, joiners, adhesives and tape, as well as welding and soldering materials. Busceme's artworks have a similar aesthetic, without the direct references to industrial parts. Highly detailed and abstract, his drawings invite visitors to look closely at the surface, encouraging repeated viewing.

Busceme hopes that visitors will keep an open-mind when viewing his artwork so that they might see all the possibilities for how his work could be interpreted.

Sun, Sand & Strokes is the theme for AMSET's Summer ArtVentures 2025. This year's line-up of week-long, half-day workshops, from June 9 through July 24, is more exciting than ever, with wearable fashion, sculpting with scraps, printmaking, clay and much more. Summer ArtVentures is offered Monday through Friday with two workshops per day: morning classes are from 9 a.m. – 12 p.m. and afternoon classes are from 1 p.m. – 4 p.m. Children ages 5-14 choose from many class options for a high quality, intensive art education experience. All courses are taught by artists and art professionals, and the participants work closely with these respected artists in a variety of mediums.

Campers are divided into three age groups, with each course designed for age-appropriate art activities.

The Art Museum of Southeast Texas is thrilled to announce the latest additions to its permanent collection. These remarkable works, generously gifted by patrons and acquired through museum purchases, further AMSET's mission to preserve and celebrate artistic excellence.

Two of the newly acquired works come as generous gifts from longtime supporters Rob Clark and Jerry Thacker. Virgil Grotfeldt's *Stag Hunt* (1988) is a mixed media work on paper, meticulously preserved in an archival frame. Known for his evocative and layered compositions, Grotfeldt's Stag Hunt is a compelling addition to AMSET's collection.


